



**Bob Shaut, Senior High Jazz Band**, retired from public school teaching after 37 years in the Poughkeepsie and Kingston Districts. His most outstanding accomplishment was directing the Kingston High School Jazz Ensemble and being selected to perform at Lincoln Center, having placed in the finals of the international Essentially Ellington competition. Bob also was an adjunct saxophone instructor at Vassar College as well as co-director of the Ulster Community College jazz ensemble.

As a saxophonist, Bob has performed with The Temptations, The Four Seasons, Andy Williams, Joan Rivers, Phyllis Diller, the Four Tops and many more. Currently, Bob performs with Andrea in the Father/Daughter Duo; Third Ghost (an avant garde trio); The Big Bang Big Band; The Altered Nine (jazz nonet); and with son Dan in the Dan Shaut Swing Orchestra; the Woodstock Horns in Professor Louie and the Crowmatrix; and the Napoli/Shaut Sextet. Since 1985 Bob has lead Sax Life, a saxophone quartet with rhythm section. This group has had a residence at the Art Bar in Kingston, NY for two years.

Bob writes the music for several of the above groups, and some of his pieces have been performed around the country.



**Timothy Hamblin, Senior High Chorus**: Moving to Sullivan County in 1988 Tim began his career as a music teacher with the Liberty Central School District. During his tenure he taught at all levels, with the last 16 at the High School where he taught Music Appreciation, Piano Class and conducted the Mixed Chorus and Select Choir. Tim also served as Director of Music K-12 for several years. In June of 2021, with 33 successful and productive years, he retired.

He was active in the Sullivan County Music Educators Association throughout his career, serving as Chairperson or accompanist for numerous groups. He held the position of Vice President on the SCMEA Executive Board for many years. Working in conjunction with other dedicated, talented and supportive colleagues to promote, inspire and encourage students in the artistic process are memories Tim will forever cherish.

Tim received his music education degree from Ithaca College with a concentration in piano performance and a minor in voice. Earning a Masters Degree in Elementary Education in 1993 from SUNY New Paltz scored Tim dual certification. Tim attended the Ithaca College Summer Music Institute in 1994 and 1995 and earned Post graduate credits in piano pedagogy, vocal pedagogy, and Advanced choral conducting.



**Kate Stocker, Junior High Orchestra** is an engaging educator and performer in the metropolitan New York area. Throughout her career, her passion to collaborate and make music with those around her has always been palpable.

The foundation of Ms. Stocker's career has been built on giving all students an opportunity to have a rich and rewarding musical experience, regardless of ability. During her tenure as string teacher at Briarcliff Middle School, she co-founded the Rivertowns Honors Orchestra, a multi-district festival featuring middle school orchestra and band students. As the strings teacher at the Packer Collegiate Institute in Brooklyn, Ms. Stocker led her students in a concert on the hallowed stage at Carnegie Hall, as well as a performance tour to Munich and Salzburg. Ms. Stocker currently teaches strings at the Hommocks Middle School in Mamaroneck, in Westchester County. She continues to create positive musical experiences for all students by bridging the gap between elementary and middle school in a large and successful school district. Additionally, Ms. Stocker has also been director of Hommocks' musical theater program.

While the majority of her career has been in Westchester County, Ms. Stocker's ties have always remained close to her native Long Island. She is a proud alum of the Usdan Center for Creative and Performing Arts, where she spent several summers managing the orchestra program, as well as conducting the junior orchestra and piloting a beginner's strings class.

Beyond the classroom, Ms. Stocker has achieved much success as a conductor and performer. She has conducted several All-County festivals around New York State, served on the board for the Westchester County School Music Association (WCSMA) and performed with and served as board president of the Brooklyn Symphony Orchestra. Ms. Stocker is also the second violinist of the Meadowlark Quartet, which has performed at Lincoln Center, the Brooklyn Museum, and other notable concert venues.

Ms. Stocker received her Bachelor of Science in Music Education from the Sunderman Conservatory at Gettysburg College in 2007, and her Masters of Science in Music Education from Western Connecticut State University in 2011. She is humbled and honored to stand on the conductors' podium for this SCMEA festival!

**Hold On:** A few months ago I heard a presentation by Sullivan 180 on the health and welfare of our county residents. Various statistical data was shared. There was one on teenage suicide that was most disturbing to me. Sullivan County has the 2nd highest rate of teenage suicide in the state. While the complexities of why are complicated we must work to change this sobering statistic.

This song was written for a friend whose brother had committed suicide. Adam Tice shared the following about his composition “While there are many songs that invite individuals to a community to a community of faith, I have found very few that name the commitment of the community to an individual.” It was the poignant lyrics and expressive melody that immediately drew me to choose this selection. “And when your hope is gone and you can’t hold on, we will hold on to you” is the repeated message in this song and one I hope we embrace as a community. Music can comfort the distressed.

**I Sing Because I’m Happy:** Civilla Martin wrote this in 1905 when she was visiting Elmira, NY with her husband. While there they met a lady whose deteriorating health confined her to bed. Her husband had been crippled and used a wheelchair for mobility. The Martin’s were inspired by the positive spirit of the elderly couple despite their extreme health challenges. When Mr. Martin asked what provided them the strength of positivity when dealing with such adversity the women responded “his eye is on the sparrow and I know he watches me”. That phrase stuck with Mrs. Martin and the rest, shall we say, is history.

Based on the gospel hymn “His Eye Is On The Sparrow” this arrangement provides the listener with characteristics of the gospel style. While the root of the text is biblically based, other interpretations can exist in our modern society. The history of popular music derived from the roots of jazz. Jazz, of course, developed from and has characteristics of the African American Spiritual. From a historical perspective programming spirituals has always been my way of not forgetting our cultural journey. Spirituals inherently leave a person feeling uplifted and that is how I like to leave an audience. After the pandemic rendered choirs silent I wanted an uplifting and energetic closing selection that expressed the passion and joy singing provides. Do I sing because I’m happy or Am I happy because I sing? It does not matter, just SING! Out of the silence, music survives and once again we sing. Music alone shall live, never to die.

**Normandy Beach:** This appealing and stately British style march has been a staple in the repertoire for young bands since it was first published in 1982. Written using a tempo which is slower than typical American marches, it opens with a feature for percussion and flutes. Gradually other sections join the mix until reaching the magnificent strains for full band. From there, the instrumentation thins out, leading to a reprise of the flute and percussion statement. - Publisher's program note

**Fiero:** This dynamic Latin-style piece features expanded percussion parts and aggressive rhythms, highlighting a soaring, Spanish-style melody, featuring a variety of dynamics and syncopated rhythms. Publisher's program note

#### **Senior High Mixed Chorus:**

**Hallelujah, Amen:** This popular piece in the classic choral world is from Handel's Oratorio Judas Maccabeus. Oratorios were dramatic works, composed as if they were operas, but specifically designed not to be staged. During Handel's time stage productions were not allowed during the season of Lent so he developed this medium to maneuver around the strict rule. His other famous oratorio is The Messiah with the famous "Hallelujah Chorus".

Judah was considered a warrior for driving the Greek occupants out of Judea. When he was killed in a victorious battle his brothers, father and followers were completely disheartened. The Maccabees, who were inspired by Judah, eventually ousted the Greeks from the land for good. They celebrated this victory with the holiday Hanukkah. The celebratory spirit of the music is conveyed throughout the song with its energetic tempo. In the text we are reminded of the significant honor and respect his faithful followers had for Judah. Music can celebrate and honor.

**Set Me As A Seal Upon My Heart:** The text from the Song of Solomon is perhaps the most descriptive in explaining the power of love. During the time of King Solomon it was custom to seal documents or anything of importance with a piece of wax with the King's imprint. The opening of the text is the bride asking the King to set her like a seal upon his heart. A sealed document with an image of the king meant that the king took ownership of the contents. A seal with her image and his image perfectly matched for in marriage they became one. Heart to heart because their love is unquenchable and stronger than death.

David Childs conveys the concept of becoming one by having the choir sing parts of the text in unison. The large intervals contained in the beautiful opening melody makes this a rigorous piece for high school choirs. Music can express or describe eternal love.

# Program Notes

## Elementary Chorus

**Ode To Peace:** The story of Ludwig Van Beethoven's inclusion of "Ode To Joy" in his final 9th Symphony has been passed down for generations. Many recount of Beethoven "crazily" wandering around the towns humming Friedrich Schillers children's tune, never knowing the masterpiece that would emerge. The tragedy is that Beethoven would never hear his final work, as by this time he had become completely deaf. I can only imagine the pain and torture for someone with such a perfect gift to have to endure the slow loss of hearing starting in 1803 until his death in 1827. I am so glad to have shared this beautiful piece with your children that so expertly incorporates Beethoven with the beautiful idea of "peace and love for all man-kind in Jill Gallina Original text.

**Hine ma tov:** "Behold, how good it is for brethren to dwell together in peace." When I think of this text I am reminded very fondly of the story of two first-grade boys who got their haircut the same and wore the same exact outfit to trick their teacher even though they were both of different races. This beautiful story and the children I teach every day in the Poughkeepsie City School District lead me to believe our future is going to turn out just fine.

On a personal note, it is very special to me to share the choral music of Allan Naplan. He, as am I, was a graduate of the Ithaca College School of Music.

**This Is Me from The Greatest Showman:** How fortunate we are to be living during the time of the resurgence of the movie musical. This song speaks of standing up and being proud of who you are. This is a beautiful message for these and all times.

## Middle School Band

**Medieval Dance** is based upon a secular song, Amours, que porra devenir (O love, what will become of me) composed by the French nobleman and poet Thibaut de Blason probably around 1200 A.D. This new arrangement is marked "Lively." The mixolydian melody is first played by flute, oboe, trumpet, and bells in octave unisons, but the straightforward and effective scoring allows every section a melodic opportunity.

**Ye Banks and Braes O'Bonnie Doon:** The Banks O' Doon is a Scots song written by Robert Burns in 1791, sometimes known as Ye Banks and Braes (after the opening line of the third version). Burns set the lyrics to an air called The Caledonian Hunt's Delight. Michael Sweeney takes this tender and lyrical folk song and creates a marvelous setting. This arrangement provides a wealth of musicality through creative harmonies and skilled scoring. Every section gets a chance to play the melody at some point.

**Swahili Folk Hymn:** This spirited number from East Africa will keep all members busy. Percussionists play authentic rhythms that groove and there is an optional section where students can easily improvise, compose or play written solos.

## Junior High Orchestra

**March of the Meistersingers** from the Opera "Die Meistersinger.": Richard Wagner's opera Die Meistersinger von Nürnberg is one of his later dramas, and an opera "full of daylight." The March heard on stage today uses "huge, broad, rich [overlapping] themes" to convey optimism and confidence. The opera explores the value of music as an art form, with the Meistersingers of the title referring to the townspeople of the German city of Nuremberg who have trained long and hard to earn the title of "Master Singer." One such singer in Wagner's story offers his daughter's hand in marriage to the winner of a singing competition that he arranges. Program note paraphrased from Julian Johnson's video introduction to Glyndebourne Opera's first production of Die Meistersinger von Nürnberg.

**Fantasy on a Japanese Folk Song:** "Based on the enchanting melody of Sakura, Sakura, this fantasy on the popular Japanese folk song winds through several melodic shifts and harmonic variations," writes modern-day composer, conductor, and educator Brian Balmages. The tune evokes the beautiful pink cherry blossoms that are widespread during Spring in Japan. Slower and delicate, it provides a welcome contrast to the other selections in today's performance.

**William Tell Overture Excerpt:** Composer Giachino Rossini probably never imagined in 1829 that his opera's first few minutes would become one of the most ubiquitous and recognizable musical themes ever. You may know the William Tell Overture as the theme song to the American Western drama The Lone Ranger. Since the 1930's, movies, radio, and television have reinforced the "memory" of this piece in the minds of many in America and around the world.

William Tell was a hero in Swiss legend. Rossini set the story of William Tell to music, and the tune we know today was born. The galloping theme is introduced by a lone trumpet in the original work, then joined by horns and strings in a wild release of pent up energy following the slower, more tension-filled opening of the Overture. ## Junior High Band

**Jungle Dance** is a new type of piece for me [Brian Balmages]. It depicts a celebration in the middle of a jungle. It is not specific to people -- it actually represents the celebration of all living things -- animals, plants, and people-- all coming together in a high energy celebration of life and nature. The melody itself is quite infectious and is treated as a passacaglia... The melody repeats constantly while the textures, rhythms and harmonies around it change and develop. - Program Note by composer
