

WORKERS OFF FOR AMERICA.

Unemployed in Europe Are Likely to Seek Opportunities Here.

BERLIN, Nov. 13.—The election of Judge Taft to the Presidency and the rosy reports of prosperity in consequence thereof which have reached Europe have had the immediate effect of turning the emigrant tide again toward America. The Hamburg-American liner Amerika, when she left Cuxhaven yesterday on her westward voyage, carried 1,600 steerage passengers, the largest number a German vessel has carried to New York since last Winter.

The steamship authorities are jubilant and predict that immigration to the United States will soon resume its old-time proportions. All the lines are preparing for a record-breaking business between now and next Summer.

The movement westward will be greatly accelerated by the prevailing lack of employment in practically every European country. The situation is so serious in Germany that the Reichstag to-day took up the question of providing national means of some form or other to prevent the problem of the unemployed from reaching the desperate proportions it has so long had in England.

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
