THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION'S 2013 ALL-CLASS REUNION

Over 250 alumni and guests attended the 2013 All-Class Reunion on Saturday and Sunday, June 22nd and 23rd. The event provided alumni an opportunity to reconnect with the school and fellow Stuy graduates. Activities included student/alumni competitions (basketball, chess and math), an alumni author literary panel, a discussion on the state of public education in New York City (with mayoral candidates **Sal Albanese** and **John Liu** as speakers) and student performances/demonstrations (Robotics Team, Speech & Debate Team, Indian Dance, Cheerleaders and the Jazz Band). Current students led alumni tours of the "new" Stuyvesant; the "old" Stuy building was also open on Sunday afternoon and many alumni took the opportunity to visit and reminisce. **Henk Rogers '72** recalled: "When four students were shot and killed during a demonstration at Kent State University, Stuyvesant students demonstrated outside the old school for a week. Riot police on horseback and on foot cleared the street. We made our point and stood shoulder to shoulder with all students who have demonstrated against social injustice everywhere.

It made me proud to be a student at Stuyvesant." **Elli Barasch '73** recalled: "I was a middling English student, so was sent to a newbie's classroom. I lucked out; I was assigned to him two more times. Decades after teaching us the literature of Melville, Mishima, Beckett, and Shakespeare, this man found some success writing his own memoirs. I also had the good fortune to be the director of the Seniors in Sing I in 1973. We lost miserably to the Juniors that year, but the experience gave me the opportunity to meet a very funny guy named **Paul Reiser** and a mensch named **Albert Capsouto**." **Ralph Gelper, June '49** wrote: "It was quite an experience for me and my wife walking the halls I walked 60 odd years ago. When I closed my eyes and stopped for a moment, I felt and remembered it all." (*Also see Letters, p. 4.*) The reunion classes of '53, '58 and '72 took part, and '53 and '72 held reunion dinners Saturday evening (*see Class Notes*).

- Intel Science Talent Search Contest—we had ten national semifinalists (the highest number in the nation) and one finalist, the only one from NYC.
- Siemens Science competition—two regional champions, two regional finalists.

- Six talented science researchers were selected to represent NYC in May at the Intel International Science and Engineering Fair (ISEF) in Phoenix.
- StuyPulse Team 694, the Stuyvesant Robotics team, won the First Place Award at the Northeast FIRST regional tournament.
- The prowess of our young students is in every area, including Language, the Arts, Writing, Speech & Debate...the list is very long.

As always, there have been some esteemed faculty members who have retired or moved on to other opportunities, and the Class of 2013 seats are filled by those in the incoming Class of 2017. Although the names and faces change, the basic

mission and strength of Stuyvesant stays the same—to provide the highest-quality education to the most talented youngsters in NYC. For more than a hundred years a Stuyvesant diploma has served as the path to success for striving students who may be immigrants, financially needy, or without the resources that their peers in private and suburban schools may possess. STUYVESANT MOURNS THE PASSING OF A GENEROUS ALUM

Richard Grand, Esq., June '47 (NYU; University of Arizona College of Law), died April 7, 2013. He was a very successful plaintiff's trial lawyer (his *Arizona Daily Star* obituary headline: *Tucson Attorney's Huge Trial Awards Matched his Name*), and the founder of The Inner Circle of Advocates, an elite group of plaintiffs' attorneys (members included Johnnie Cochran and John Edwards). He is survived by his wife of 61 years, Marcia, and daughter, Cindy.



Recalling his own experiences, Mr. Grand created the "Richard Grand Helping Hand Fund 1947" to help financially needy Stuyvesant students buy or do something fun or special for themselves that they would not have been able to afford otherwise. Over the past five years, more than 90 students have benefited from his generosity. And in 2013 he also donated funds for "Grand Ideas Essay Contest" winners.

Students were able to purchase: Laptops, bikes, cameras, presents for family, art supplies, contact lenses, an electronic keyboard, a digital drawing tablet, science fiction novels, fantasy novels and sports equipment. Students were also able to: Attend a writing program, take a trip, take a cooking class, take karate lessons, see a Broadway show, attend Speech & Debate camp, join a local gym, see a favorite band, take friends out to dinner, take guitar lessons, play paintball, take piano lessons, go to the opera, go to Radio City Music Hall, go skydiving, go ice skating, go rock climbing, take piano lessons, hear performances at Lincoln Center, among other things.

Grateful students wrote to Mr. Grand:

- I am planning to spend some of this money on something that I've wanted to do for a while now: go to Six Flags.
- Thanks to the funds I received, not only will I be able to afford prom, but I will be able to buy a dress and essentially give myself the once in a lifetime prom-night that I have been hoping for.
- Something special that I plan to do with the money would be to go with the rest of the Robotics Team to the tournaments out of state. I would finally be able to pay for the trips myself and join my friends and teammates while we compete.
- One thing really special that I would like to do is to throw a birthday party for my 18th birthday. I have lived in America for 14 years, but I never had a birthday party for myself.
- And, students were also inspired by Mr. Grand's generosity:
 - Thank you, Mr. Grand, for making it possible for me and for many other students. I sincerely wish there were more people who, following your example, lend a hand to students whose dreams are desolate due to financial restraints. And I hope that one day I will be one of these people.
 - Your generosity has inspired me greatly. I hope to follow in your footsteps in the future by giving back to my school and the community. Again, thank you for your contribution.
 - The motivation behind your grants is quite inspirational, and now aware that there is such a philanthropist, I hope to do something of this sort in the future. Hopefully, one day I will have the ability.

Thank you. Your generous donation will help to defray the expenses necessary to continue our tradition of excellence in both Cross Country and Track & Field. Listed below are just a few of the highlights of the last year: The boys XC team finished 2nd in the PSAL Championships; and the Frosh also finished 2nd at the city frosh championships. Over the past 9 years we were 1st four times, and 2nd three times. **Jack Stevenson '13** has the Van Cortlandt park school record for 5000M (16:13) and 2.5 miles (12:49). Last year **Konrad Surkont '12** set a PSAL Bowdoin Park record of 16:09 at the NY State Federation Championships. Last May our team completed its 12th consecutive

Manhattan Triple Crown by winning the Cross Country, Indoor Track and Outdoor Track Championships. Our distance medley relay finished 4th in the nation at the indoor National Championships last March. Their time of 10:12.2 is a PSAL indoor record. Konrad Surkont set a PSAL indoor record for 3200M (2 miles) of 9:13.5 at the Eastern States Championship.

"First Girls" Honored: Alice DeRivera Haines, MD was a Guest Speaker at the Class of 2013 graduation ceremonies on June 25th at The Palace Theater. She received an honorary Stuyvesant Diploma. Her lawsuit against the NYC Board of Education in 1969 opened the specialized high schools to girls. She said she didn't get to attend Stuyvesant after winning because her family moved away from the city. While the lawsuit was going on, some boys from Stuyvesant told her they had renamed the cafeteria Alice's Restaurant. Three additional "first girls" were also soluted during the ceremony (see photo above).

Stuyvesant High School Black Alumni Diversity Initiative

On May 18th, the Stuyvesant High School Black Alumni Diversity Initiative sponsored its sixth "Why Stuy?" open house for prospective applicants and their parents and its second alumni forum, a panel discussion, *Promoting Excellence and Diversity: Perspectives on the Specialized High School Admissions Process*, featuring **Damon Hewitt, Esq.** of the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund, **Khin Mai Aung, Esq.** of the Asian American Legal Defense and Education Fund, **Ainsley Rudolfo**, of the New York City Department of Education, **David Bloomfield, Esq.** of CUNY and **Daniel Tillman**, a current Stuyvesant HS teacher. Proceeds from the panel discussion were used to provide professional SHSAT prep to promising students.

The Stuyvesant High School Black Alumni Diversity Initiative was created in 2010 by a group of Black alumni who wanted to address the decline in Black enrollment at Stuyvesant from its high of over 10% during the 70s and 80s to less than 1% today. Since its inception, the Stuyvesant High School Black Alumni Diversity Initiative has engaged in outreach and fundraising to increase the number of Black and Latino students who attend Stuyvesant and the city's other specialized high schools.

The Diversity Initiative welcomes partnerships with groups and individuals who support our goals and who are willing to work cooperatively with us. 

1940 (January) Julian Hochberg (*see photo and caption on p. 5*).

1942 (January) Robert Basch (SUNY, Cortland; SUNY Brockport, MEd) celebrated his 90th birthday in March. He served in the US Coast Guard during WWII. He earned his degrees through the GI Bill, and worked as Director of Health, Physical Education and Recreation for 43 years at six different Jewish Community Centers around the US. He wrote, "I still have fond memories of the old SHS building on 15th Street in Lower Manhattan. Best of all, though, I often recall the two seasons I played right end on the varsity football team under Coach Joe Monahan. We went from a losing team in 1940 to the Bronx-Manhattan champions in 1941. That season we beat Clinton HS, our arch rival, and we won a close game (7-0) against Monroe HS for the championship. A visit to the new SHS is on my bucket list." He now lives in West Bloomfield, MI near his son, daughter-in-law and two grandchildren.

1943 (January) Robert Cohen donated his January 1943 graduation list to the Alumni Association's archives. He said he feels very proud of Stuyvesant.

(See www.StressFreeNow.info.) He wrote: “For the first time, the study demonstrates that the same physiological mechanism needed to induce relaxation also helps us dissolve pain and grief. The study bolsters the linkage between the physiological mechanisms underlying the Relaxation Response and any method which causes a Relaxation Response to occur. A key finding was that any method which engenders a Relaxation Response may spike endogenous cyclic nitric oxide. Since the health benefits of nitric oxide spiking are widely known and have been documented in thousands of studies, there is a health policy implication, which, if implemented, can result in significant improvements to the health of Americans. The study’s results confirm that a shift to a wellness paradigm means that prevention is now more profitable than pathology.”

1936 (January) Salvatore Frascinella died May 12, 2013. His niece, Gracemary Hagan, wrote: "He was a lifelong lover of learning and a wonderful testament to a Stuyvesant High School education."

1938 (June) Morris Grossman, PhD (Columbia, BA, MA, PhD) died December 12, 2012. He was a Professor of Philosophy at Fairfield University from 1968 to 1992. He also taught at Pennsylvania State and Portland State. During his academic career, his essays on prominent philosophers appeared in major philosophical journals. He is survived by his sister, Rima Zimmerman, cousins, nieces and nephews.

1940 (January) Richard Bader, MD (Columbia, College of Physicians and Surgeons) died in April 2013. He and his identical twin brother Mortimer (who died in 2003) graduated first and second in their class at Stuyvesant. During WWII he served in the Army in the Arctic studying the effects of the cold on metabolism. At Mount Sinai Hospital he co-founded the pulmonary function laboratory, researched collagen vascular diseases, basic pulmonary physiology and occupational lung disease, including pioneering work on asbestosis. He was in private practice with his twin brother, and also served as associate editor of the American Journal of Medicine and as a clinical professor of medicine at the Mount Sinai School of Medicine. He received the Jacobi Medallion for distinguished achievement in the field of medicine and extraordinary service to Mount Sinai Hospital. In 1989 he became the first Horace W. Goldsmith Professor of Medicine. In 2004, the

Mortimer E. Bader and Richard A. Bader Professorship in Medicine at the Mount Sinai School of Medicine was named for them. He is survived by his wife, Elizabeth; two children; and two grandchildren.

1940 (June) John Milton Simon (CCNY) died June 27, 2013. Because his parents were destitute during the depression, he and some of his siblings were raised in the Hebrew Orphan Asylum in NYC. After briefly studying drama at UCLA, he served in the US Army Air Force during WWII in England as a gunner. He worked for several textiles firms: Gehring Textiles, where he became VP; Native Textiles, where he became president; and his own warp knit textile company, Veratex, Inc. He was a founding partner in one of NYC's first commercial coops at his company's headquarters in midtown Manhattan. He was also involved with the Glen Cove, NY Golf Course for many years, and served as Commissioner for ten years. He is survived by his wife, Vicki (Vera Claireaux) Simon (whom he met at a USO dance in England); three children; and six grandchildren.

1941 (January) George Keleshian died April 11, 2013. In February, he celebrated his 90th birthday with family and friends. His Armenian parents and siblings fled the genocide during WWI. During WWII, he worked at a defense plant in Bridgeport, CT. A photo engraver, he was partner and owner of Kitab Engraving and Van Allyn Graphics. As a child, he prided himself as a "two sewer" stickball champ. He loved sports and was a league championship bowler, an avid golfer, and fan of the NY Giants, and both the Mets and the Yankees. Many family and friends donated generously to the Alumni Association in his memory. His family said that he was always very proud of his Stuyvesant education, looked forward to the newsletters, and often reminisced about episodes with his teachers and classmates. In 2008, he visited the new Stuyvesant building. He was predeceased by his wife, Eleanor Blajian, whom he cared for during her long illness with Alzheimer's disease. He became a "Volunteer Extraordinaire," at her nursing home, delivering newspapers and lending a helping hand to all. He is survived by his children Donna, Gregory, and Adriane and their families.

1941 (June) Charles Gilvarg, PhD (Cooper Union; U. of Chicago, PhD) Princeton Professor Emeritus, died January 6, 2013. He received the American Chemical Society's Paul Lewis Award for outstanding researchers under 40. In 1964, he became a professor at Princeton where he was the first chair of the Biochemical Sciences (which

became Molecular Biology). He worked on amino-acid biosynthesis and transport, and was part of the biochemical-research renaissance during the 1960s and 1970s. At the time of his death, he was working on a biological indicator of early-stage pancreatic cancer. He is survived by his wife, Frieda (who said, "Science was his absolute focus...I was resigned to the fact that he would never be totally retired, even though he pretended to be."); four children; and eight grandchildren.

1942 (June) Yenwith Whitney (MIT; Columbia, Doctorate in Education) died April 12, 2011. He served as a fighter pilot in Europe as a member of the elite Tuskegee Airmen, in the Army Air Corps during WWII. After the war, he graduated from MIT on the GI Bill and worked in aeronautical engineering. He joined the Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church, and served in Cameroon, West Africa as a teacher of math and physics for ten years. After returning to the USA, he became a lay church executive for the Presbyterian Church. He briefly served as principal of Boggs Academy in Keysville, Ga. He continued his church service as Liaison with Africa and later as Associate for Southern Africa. He was a member of the Boule. He worked with MIT in their recruitment efforts. He also worked with the Tuskegee Airmen Association, giving talks about his wartime experiences. During retirement he served as an elder of the First Presbyterian Church of Sarasota, FL. His first wife, Muriel Johnson, and his second wife, Lorenza Washington, predeceased him. He is survived by two daughters, a step-son, and a grandson.

1943 (June) Harry Evans (Queens College) died May 3, 2013. He served in the US Army (1945 to 1947). He was an executive at Ford Motor Company and later Ford Motor Credit Company until retirement in 1984. His wife, Anita Evans, of 63 years donated his June 1943 *Indicator* to the Alumni Office. **Selig (Zel) Wiener** died April 30, 2013. He was a proud Stuyvesant alumnus. He was predeceased by two children. He is survived by his wife of almost 60 years, Rita; and two grandchildren.

1944 (June) Robert Fogel, PhD (Cornell; Columbia, MA; Johns Hopkins, PhD), Charles R. Walgreen Distinguished Service Professor of American Institutions, and director of the Center for Population Economics, University of Chicago, Booth School of Business, died June 11, 2013. He won the Nobel Prize in Economics Sciences in 1993 for his work using quantitative methods in economic history (known as cliometrics or econometric history) of

the US railroads, and the economics of slavery in America. His book, *Railroads and American Economic Growth: Essays in Econometric History*, was published in 1964, and his controversial book, co-authored with Stanley Engerman, *Time on the Cross: The Economics of American Negro Slavery*, was published in 1974. Before joining the faculty at the University of Chicago in 1964, he taught at Johns Hopkins, the University of Rochester, and Harvard. His 2002 book, *The Fourth Great Awakening and the Future of Egalitarianism*, deals with the history of American religion and social reform. His wife, Enid Cassandra Morgan, whom he called "his tireless, unpaid research assistant" died in 2007. He is survived by two sons, five grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren. **Robert Marks** died January 3, 2013. He was a veteran of WWII and fought in Combat Infantry in the Okinawa invasion. He was decorated with a combat infantry badge. He worked in the banking field. He was the brother of William Marks, SHS '47. **Richard Stern** (U. of North Carolina, Chapel Hill; Harvard, MA; U. of Iowa, PhD) died January 24, 2013. He wrote novels, short stories and essays, and taught literature and creative writing at the University of Chicago from 1955 until he retired in 2001. In 1985, he received the Medal of Merit for the Novel, awarded every six years by the Academy of Arts and Letters. His novels include *Other Men's Daughters* (1973), and *A Father's Words* (1986). An early short story, *The Sorrows of Captain Schreiber*, won an O. Henry award as one of the best short stories of 1954. His first marriage, to Gay Clark, ended in divorce. 1946 (January) Seymour Lederberg, PhD (Cornell; U. of Illinois, Urbana, PhD), Professor Emeritus, Brown University, died February 1, 2013. His daughter, Sarah Lederberg Stone, wrote: "My dad was so very proud of his Stuyvesant history." He served in the US Navy during WWII. For over 50 years he was on the faculty at Brown where he served as the Chairman for the Section of Microbiology and Molecular Biology; was a founding member of the Department of Molecular Microbiology and Immunology; was the first Associate Dean for Graduate Studies in Biology and Medicine; and the author of over 30 scientific publications. and law. Emeritus since 2001, he continued to attend research seminars. He was married to the late Justice Victoria (Santopietro) Lederberg. One of his brothers was Nobel Laureate, Joshua Lederberg, SHS, January '41. He is survived by two children, and six grandchildren.

He was the brother of Josh Glaser, SHS '45, and Jerry Glaser, SHS '48. His son, Robert Glaser, wrote: "He was proud to have been a Stuyvesant graduate, and always conveyed to folks the benefits he received as a student and graduate of the school."

1948 (June) Edgar "Buddy" Freitag (Baruch College) died May 30, 2012. He served in the US Army for two years and then worked in advertising for 17 years, becoming the VP of Grey Advertising. He then co-founded United Financial of America, a brokerage and commercial mortgage firm, which he later sold. Between 2007 and 2012, he and his wife, Barbara Freitag, produced on and Off Broadway theater plays and musicals, including many Tony nominated and winning shows. Among others, they were involved with: *The Drowsy Chaperone*; *Memphis*; *The Goat, Or Who is Sylvia*; *Porgy and Bess*; *Nice Work If You Can Get It*; *End of the Rainbow*; *The Homecoming*; *Passing Strange*; *The Miracle Worker*; *Catch Me If You Can*; *West Side Story*; *Legally Blonde*; *In the Heights*; and *All My Sons*. In addition to his wife, he is survived by their four children, and seven grandchildren. **Fred Vidro** (CCNY, Economics/Sociology) died March 26, 2013. He served in the US Army during the Korean War. He worked on online computer systems for the financial industry

for Underwood Corporation and Olivetti Corporation. After his retirement in 1980, he was involved with SCORE (Senior Core of Retired Executives) where he mentored many in business and entrepreneurship. He loved music, especially jazz and Latin music. He and his wife won a bottle of Champagne in a mambo competition on their honeymoon at The Nevele Resort in the Catskills, NY. They traveled through Europe, Asia, and the US. His classmate, Jack Mutoran, said Fred "often spoke fondly of the years he spent at Stuyvesant." He is survived by his wife of 59 years, Florence; two children; and four grandchildren.

1949 (June) George Juergens, PhD (Columbia; Oxford, MA; Columbia, PhD, History), Professor Emeritus, History, Indiana University, died February 3, 2013. He served in the US Army from 1956 to 1958 as public relations specialist and as a stringer for local newspapers. After teaching at Dartmouth and Amherst, he joined the faculty of Indiana University in 1967 where he taught the first African American history course. He was the author of *Joseph Pulitzer and the New York World* and *News From the White House: The Presidential Press Relationship in the Progressive Era*. He won the Amoco Foundation Distinguished Teaching Award, the Student Choice Award, the Student Alumni Council Distinguished Teaching Award and the Brown Derby, twice. He was the recipient of a number of grants for his research, including a Fulbright, a Ford Foundation Fellowship and a National Endowment for the Humanities Senior Faculty Fellowship. George is survived by his wife, Bonnie J. Brownlee; and two sons.

1950 (January) Morton Lewin (Princeton, BS, MS, PhD, Electrical Engineering) died February 20, 2013. As a child he played stickball with the "Hawks," and also developed a lifelong passion for music, as both performer and arranger. During the Korean War, he enlisted in the Army Band. He worked at RCA for 14 years, and was awarded more than ten patents and received the "Outstanding Young Electrical Engineer" award from the National Electrical Engineering Society in 1966. In 1972, he became a professor at Rutgers University, where he remained until retirement in 1999. He published *Logic Design and Computer Organization and Elements of C*. He played saxophone, piano and jazz flute. He is survived by his wife of more than 60 years, Suki; four children; and eight grandchildren.

1951 (January) Richard Petty (CCNY) died February 21, 2013. He worked for his family's dry cleaning business while

attending Stuyvesant (where he was one of only a few Black students). After Stuyvesant he served in the US Air Force from 1952 through 1956. During his career at the Naval Ocean Systems Center (NOSC), in San Diego, CA, he received over 20 awards and accommodations for his contributions to satellite design and exemplary management style. He was an avid reader and enjoyed all things mathematical and technological. He prided himself on solving complex math problems, and he never met a gadget he didn't like. He also had an extensive collection of various kinds of music, mostly jazz. He is survived by his wife, Tabor Knight; three daughters; eight grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren.

1951 (June) Jerome Goodman died August 8, 2012. His daughter, Ariel Bizon, wrote: "He enjoyed his visit back to the school and proudly wore his Stuyvesant T-shirt."

1952 (January) John Herbst (Baruch College) died January 10, 2011. He worked as an accountant for more than 40 years, first at various firms in NYC, then self-employed starting in 2000. He is survived by his wife of 52 years, Evelyn Gold; four children; and one grandchild.

1952 (June) George Lee (CCNY, Civil Engineering) died December 7, 2012. At Stuyvesant he was on the JV track team, baseball and basketball teams. He served as class president; he was also a member of the Winged Foot Society. He was awarded the Bronze Scholarship Certificate and the Silver PSAL Award. He served in the US Marine Corps in Korea and Japan. As an engineer, he specialized in structural engineering, was a lifetime member of the American Society of Civil Engineers and worked on many projects including the Guggenheim Museum and the Jacob Javitz Center. He was Facility Manager for the Tri-Borough Bridge and Tunnel Authority, City Engineer and Deputy Commission of the Department of Public Works (DPW) for the City of Mount Vernon, and was the first African American Commissioner of DPW in the city of New Rochelle. He was predeceased by his first wife, Ernestine Green. He is survived by his second wife, Dallas Berry; two children; and one grandchild.

1953 Emanuel "Manny" Gold (Cornell, BA; Cornell Law School) former Democratic NY State Senator from Forest Hills, died January 24, 2013. He was elected to the Assembly in 1970 and in 1971 to the Senate, where he served until 1998. He was the Senate Deputy Minority Leader from 1978 to 1994. In 1996, he was named the Ranking

Member on the Senate Finance Committee. He also served on the Senate's Rules and Judiciary Committees. He sponsored more than 80 laws, included the 1977 "Son of Sam" law, which prevented notorious criminals such as serial killer David Berkowitz from making money by writing their stories. After the Supreme Court overturned the law in 1991, Mr. Gold sponsored a broader statute to assist victims of all crimes. In 1994, he sponsored a law which required that NY State's educational curriculum be expanded so that children are taught about human rights violations, including the Holocaust and slavery. His interests included photography, music and sports. His sons Jeffrey and Adam predeceased him. He is survived by his wife, Judith (Silberfein) Gold; daughter, Sue Gold and son Steve Gold, SHS '78; and two granddaughters.

1956 Donald Keller died November 6, 2011. He is survived by his wife, Judith Keller, of 47 years; three sons; and two granddaughters. **Frederick Sweet, PhD** (U. of Alberta, PhD) died March 7, 2013. He was a researcher at Sloan-Kettering Institute for Cancer Research, Rye, NY before joining the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at Washington University. Before he died, he and his wife, Rita Marika Csapo-Sweet, had been investigating the role medical doctors played in genocide in the 20th century, including the Nazi Holocaust and acts of mass murder in Rwanda and Bosnia. He had a Fulbright grant to conduct research in Bosnia-Herzegovina. His wife plans to continue the work. In addition to his wife, he is survived by four children, and four grandchildren.

1957 Christ Kefalas (U. of Washington, Seattle; San Diego State, BA, MA Social Work) died April 2, 2012. He served for four years as a medic in the Air Force before earning his degrees. He worked with at-risk youth at San Diego County Probation, Children's Therapeutic Community, and Kaiser Department of Psychiatry. He is survived by his wife, Betsy; and two children. **Ronald Myles** (Queens College) died November 20, 2010. He ran a rehabilitation facility in New York before moving to California in 1989. His wife, Lillian Garcia, died in 2002. He's survived by six children; eight grandchildren; and three great-grandchildren.

1958 Nunzio Pernicone, PhD died May 30, 2013. His classmate, Karl Roth, MD, wrote (excerpted): "Nunzio and I formed a friendship as freshman in Dr. Zucker's World History class in 1954, and remained close friends ever since...We began our friendship as sons of leftist parents, mine Trotskyist socialists, his Italian anarchists. My father an immigrant from Vienna, his a Mafia escapee

from Sicily – mine a tool and die maker, his a tailor. It was an era shortly after the fall and demise of Joseph McCarthy, whom both of us knew about intimately from our home lives, and we laughed aloud at Dr. Zucker's obvious attempts to avoid any discussion of Communism in our World History class. Every Wednesday, Nunzio would arrive at Stuyvesant, dressed in a dark suit and a tie, and carrying his pencil thin umbrella, in order to attend the Metropolitan Opera matinee performances, for which he'd buy a standing room ticket on principle. Nunzio subsequently went on to become a foremost international expert on the Italian Anarchist Movement in America, authoring two monographs on the subject, with a third ready for publication shortly. Much of the research work was done in Italy, where he spent two years on two separate Fulbright fellowships. I visited with him a week before his death just after he was named Professor Emeritus at Drexel. I told him that he needed to get well soon, so we could take the trip together to Sicily which we'd talked about for years. He smiled wistfully and said softly, 'That would be nice.' He was taken much too soon, and I will miss him as my oldest and dearest friend."

1960 Stanley Snadowsky (Hunter College; Brooklyn Law School), a lawyer and music promoter, died February 25, 2013. While in law school, he and partner Allan Pepper, started promoting concerts in various clubs in NYC. In 1974 they opened the Bottom Line, described in his *New York Times* obituary as "a landmark Greenwich Village nightclub that for 30 years presented artists like Bruce Springsteen, Miles Davis and Billy Joel in a setting often described as one of New York City's great living rooms." *The Times* also stated: "The opening-night concert became legendary, drawing a star-studded audience that included Mick Jagger, Carly Simon and Stevie Wonder, who took to the stage for a jam session with the night's featured headliner, the New Orleans R&B artist Dr. John." Mr. Snadowsky is survived by his wife, Michelle; and two daughters.

1965 Arthur Jay Schwartz PhD (U. of Chicago; U. of Pittsburgh, PhD, Physics), died November 21, 2012. He taught at Pittsburgh and Carnegie Mellon before working for aerospace companies in California (as Senior Physicist with Hughes Aircraft Company; and as Technical Director with Science Applications International Corp.). He was a Principal in the business consulting firm Aries Group Ltd; and Executive VP, then Chief Technology Officer at Aura Systems, Inc. He was said to have been grateful and proud to be an alumnus of Stuyvesant. Arthur is survived by his wife of 38 years, Yolanta Schwartz; and two sons.

1977 Daniel "Danny" Lieberman (NYU) died October 18, 2012. The Alumni Association is very touched and grateful to have received a bequest from his estate. He worked for 30 years at JP Morgan Chase. His interests were biking and Science Fiction. He founded "ebikes," a listserv. In a Streetsblog.org article titled *Remembering Danny Lieberman, a Gentle Force for Better New York Cycling*, Charles Komanoff wrote: "Before Streetsblog, there was 'ebikes.' Since the early 1990s, this listserv has been a digital village square for New York-area bicycle riders – the place where cyclists share info on routes, gear, events and politics – and an incubator for change as well. Danny Lieberman, the listserv's beloved founder, (was) moderator and guiding spirit, and a mainstay of the 5 Borough Bike Club...Danny and ebikes were a perfect pair: unglamorous, talkative, ecumenical, workmanlike...and essential." Danny served as ride leader for the Five Borough Bicycle Club (5BBC), volunteered for Transportation Alternatives, and served as a marshal and ride organizer at the Montauk Century and Bike New York. He is survived by his mother, Leah Lieberman.

1978 Roland Laird (Brown University; NYIT) died February 7, 2013. He was an artist, writer, scientist, political activist, and football fan. He was a leading rusher/scorer on Stuyvesant's football team and placed regionally in track. He was a co-author of *Still I Rise: A Graphic History of African-Americans* (2009). He was CEO of My Image Studios (MIST), an entertainment complex in Harlem. He had been a panelist at the May 2012 "Why Stuy?" diversity event where he spoke about the vital need for Black students at Stuyvesant and other elite schools to have a community in which they could feel comfortable. He is survived by his wife, Taneshia Nash Laid; his daughters, Imani and Naima; family members; and a large network of friends.

1990 Mark Tuminaro (Cornell School of Industrial and Labor Relations) died September 20, 2012. He worked for AFL-CIO, Food and Allied Services Trades in Washington, DC. He later worked in New York for the Labor Research Association where he produced radio and TV spots and videos for unions. He was elected First VP of Local 2179 of the UAW. In 2001, he launched Firebrand Productions, continuing his work for unions. He is survived by his parents and sister, Amelia Tuminaro, SHS '93.
