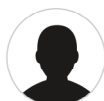

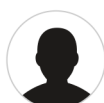
I apologize for wasting your time. I have clearly lost the trail or made a mistake somewhere along the line.

Also, from the pension record, what was the city of his residence at the time he entered military service? Are you aware of any religious affiliation? Those might give some other clues about whether you are on the right track. At this point I don't think the evidence supports that. Best.

Dear Steve,

I don't know how far you'd like me to go by way of explanation. It's been about four years now that I've been working on my paternal grandfather's family. Forgive me if I go too far.

My grandfather who died before I was born never told my father or his siblings anything at all about anyone in his family except that one time as a child he and his father got on a streetcar in NYC and ran into his uncle and another relative. One of them was the conductor on the streetcar. I think I know who that was but let me back up.

It starts with my great grandfather's consolidated military service record. He was in the Civil War. He earned a pension. The pension file has an affidavit from his daughter who mentions an aunt, "Mrs. Simons", living at an address in Brooklyn. I found the name in directories at that address for several consecutive years. That was Max (or Marks) Simons (with an 's'). His wife's name was Lizzie. I ordered their marriage certificate and verified that his parents were the same names as my great grandfather. I located and ordered Max and Lizzie's death certificate, among other documents.

Census records show Max and Lizzie had children; Charles and Freda. Freda married someone with a very common surname

and I lose the trail. Charles married Sophie and according to census records they had children; Howard, Nettie, Peter, Louis and Max.

You mentioned that your father's name was Max which led me to a theory that your father and Charles and Sophie's son Max were one and the same. I knew that Charles and Sophie's son Max was born around 1918 and I found only 2 Max Simon's born in New York City close to 1918. One passed in 1997 but was shown living with his wife in 1940 U.S. Census. He could not be Charles and Sophie's Max Simon because he was still living with his parents in 1940 according to the U.S. Census.

Charles and Sophie's Max Simon passed away in 1985. His grave in Albany, New York shows his wife May Simon. May had a daughter Mary from a previous marriage who's obituary mentions her brother, Charles Simon married to Virginia. You mentioned your brother's name was Charles.

Maybe your brother was named after his grandfather, Charles, who was listed in a U.S. Census as a "conductor" and is the same person my father met on a streetcar in New York City as a child. Maybe that Charles is your grandfather.

I'm hoping some or all of this rings true to you but I'm certainly alerted to the fact that you simply may not know.

You may have tried to find my family tree work on ancestry.com but I do not believe I have the authority to publicize information about my family so I don't. I keep my records on a private family tree on a secure private server. When I pass, the records will be taken over by my cousin who shares my privacy concerns.
