

WORKERS' OFF FOR AMERICA.

Unemployed in Europe Are Likely to Seek Opportunities Here.

Revised rules in fact favor young groups.

BELJIN, Nov. 14.—The election of Judge Taft to the Presidency and the new reports of prosperity in American shores have had the immediate effect of turning the emigrant tide again toward America. The transatlantic-American liner America, when she left Cherbourg yesterday on her westward voyage, carried 1,000 emigrant passengers, the largest number a French vessel has carried to New York since last Winter.

The emigration authorities are positive and predict that immigration to the United States will soon resume its old-time proportions. All the time are preparing for a record-breaking business between now and next Summer.

The enormous westward tide to greatly accelerated by the prevailing lack of employment in practically every European country. The situation is so serious in Germany that the Reichstag to-day took up the question of providing national means of work for all who are in need. The problem of the unemployed here reaching the desperate proportions it has so long had in England.

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
